

NGROA PICKLEBALL TURNS FOUR!

The Nellie Gail Ranch Pickleball courts opened in January 2020 to rave reviews and instant membership enthusiasm. The program has grown to 247 memberships representing 372 players. While the sport is often

referenced as a favorite new sport for seniors, it has its origins as a family game and all age groups are represented by our members. USA Pickleball reports the sport has grown from 40,000 members when we opened to over 75,000 by this year-end.

But those are just numbers. What sets our program apart is the passion for the sport and sociability displayed by our club members. The passion is evident on misty mornings as players gather at 9 am and try to dry the court surface. Sociability is on display everyday as players gather adjacent to courts and in The Watering Hole to mingle after play. Competitiveness is demonstrated when our Holiday Round Robin Tournament spots sold out within a few days of opening registrations. And club prominence is reflected in the accomplishment of our club members competing in the recent USA Pickleball National Championships in Dallas Texas winning a Silver medal in the Woman's Pro Doubles division and a Gold medal in the 4.5 Woman's Doubles 70's division.

If you are looking for a New Years Resolution that you can actually enjoy accomplishing then pick Pickleball. Our memberships are currently capped for non-homeowners but homeowners have priority to immediately join. You can sign up on-line at *https://nelliegailranch.org/recreation/pickleball*. 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NEW TRACTOR AT THE EQUESTRIAN CENTER

The Equestrian Center tractor is put to use for many heavy duty jobs. The Equestrian and Association arenas are dragged to keep the footing at an appropriate depth and consistency to provide surface stability for equestrian use. On a monthly basis 54 pallets of shavings weighing 1,900 pounds each are unloaded from delivery trucks. Annually we use the tractor to remove old footing and add and level new as needed to keep the arenas maintained. And finally, after rains the tractor regrades equestrian center paths of travel and adds gravel to resolve runoff and erosion.

It is a major adverse impact to operations when the tractor is down for maintenance. After ten years and 7,500 operational hours it became time to replace our 2013 John Deere. After an extensive review process looking at John Deere, Kubota, Case, New Holland and CAT, we purchased a 2023 CAT skip loader tractor. Funds came from the Equestrian Center Cost Center reserve funds which are funded by Equestrian Center boarding fees. We look forward to years of reliable operations on our new tractor.




TENNIS CENTER NEWS


TENNIS AND PICKLEBALL PASSES

COYOTE CAUTION

Nellie Gail Ranch by virtue of its open space design is a haven for wildlife, and one of our abundant wildlife guests is the ever present coyote. We have had recent reports of coyote's in close proximity to homes. Coyotes play an important part in our eco-system helping to keep rodent and rabbit populations under control. However, the more access they have to human food, garbage or easy prey like chickens or pets, their behavior may change. They may become more brazen and more aggressive especially during the late winter / early spring mating season.

The City of Laguna Hills contracts with Mission Viejo Animal Services to respond to reports of nuisance animals. Animal Services provided us with the following information for our homeowners to be aware of:

For service requests and complaints including wildlife concerns, please call the Animal Services Center directly at (949) 470-3045. Reports may also be submitted via e-mail to ask-shelter@cityofmissionviejo.org. Please provide Animal Services with the following who-what-when-why-where information via either the phone message or e-mail:

- Date and Time of Encounter
- Where did encounter occur?
- **Type of Encounter:** Example: Sighting from car, Sighting while walking, Human interaction, Pet interaction
- Did your encounter involve a dog or a cat?
- **Details: Example:** Coyote advanced toward me or threatened my pet.

Animal Services will evaluate the reports and specific circumstances and decide what action may be appropriate. For sightings, no action is taken as sightings are common occurrences. If a domestic animal comes in contact with a coyote and survives a bite or scratch, the interaction should be reported and the animal should be quarantined at home for 30 days or longer depending upon vaccination timing. If the domestic animal does not survive the interaction, it should be reported and the animal tested to determine if the attacking coyote has rabies in which case Animal Services would have heightened concern which may lead to trapping. Of significant concern to Animal Services are also interactions where people have been threatened. For instances of aggressive behavior near homes, Animal Services may engage in hazing to encourage the coyote to relocate away from the area to a nearby more natural habitat. Coyotes that are reported to be sick, injured or deceased will also receive a response from Animal Services.

The following are some simple precautions all homeowners can take:

- Don't allow small children to play unsupervised in unmaintained portions of your property
- Always, keep pets on leash on trails and in parks
- Keep domestic animals sheltered and protected
- Don't leave food sources available for wild animals

Our natural environment can sometimes present some discomfort, but the benefits when we weigh them out are so much greater!

Nominating Committee Charter

Purpose

The Nominating Committee ("Committee") shall solicit and recommend candidates to fill vacancies for election to the Board of Directors of not less than the number of vacancies that are to be filled.

Committee Function

- 1. The Committee shall be comprised of a chair person, who shall also be a member of the Board of Directors, and two (2) or more Members of the Association appointed by the Board of Directors.
- 2. Members of the Committee shall not also be candidates for election to the Board of Directors (during their time of service on the Nominating Committee).
- 3. Members of the Committee shall be in "good standing" with the Association. A member who is not in "good standing" for purposes of this Committee shall mean that the Member is more than ninety (90) days late in the payment of assessments to the Association, is currently in violation of the Association's governing documents which remains unaddressed for more than thirty (30) days following notice of the violation, and/or is currently, or within the past three (3) years, has been in litigation with the Association in which the Association was the prevailing party.
- 4. The Committee shall solicit and recommend candidates to fill vacant positions to the Board of Directors of not less than the number of vacancies that are to be filled.
- 5. Nominations to fill vacant positions to the Board of Directors shall consist of qualified Members who are in "good standing" with the Association as outlined above.
- 6. The Committee shall determine whether any and all candidates meet the qualifications for candidates as set forth in the Election Rules.
- 7. Nominations shall be made by the Nominating Committee prior to a ballot printing deadline to be set annually by the Board of Directors.
- 8. Quorum for each Committee meeting is established by the attendance of at least a majority of the Committee members.

Budget Allocation

There is no budget associated with Nominating Committee functions.

Term of Office

The Board of Directors makes Committee Member appointments annually.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

A DEVASTATING EARTHQUAKE IN CALIFORNIA?

Nearly every month, we hear of significant earthquakes or other disasters in other parts of the country (and of the world). Some time in the future, these other parts of the world may hear about OUR earthquake; about how the San Andreas Fault has ruptured causing a 7.8 earthquake in southern California, about how thousands may be missing or dead, how buildings have collapsed, how the resources are spread too thin and how thousands will be without water, food, and electricity for weeks to months.



Recall that we live on the Pacific's "Ring of Fire" where 90% of the world's earthquakes occur, and where 81% of the world's most devastating earthquakes occur. Living in California, earthquakes are commonplace and most of us take them in stride. Now imagine an earthquake on the San Andreas Fault with a magnitude 7.8 striking Southern California. Can this happen? It is not a function of "can it happen," it is a function of "when will it happen." According to the U.S Geologic Survey (USGS), an earthquake of this magnitude is inevitable.

What many residents don't realize is that the southern portion of the San Andreas Fault is long overdue for a major earthquake. Historically, a magnitude 7.2 or greater earthquake strikes this portion of the fault every 200 years, yet it has been over 300 years since this last occurred. An earthquake of this magnitude is likely to happen within our lifetime. Based on the high probability of this occurring, the USGS recently released the findings of a 2008 study, "The Shakeout Scenario," which include the following:

- A magnitude 7.8 earthquake will cause the San Andreas fault to shift up to 23 feet,
- Over 10 million people will experience significant shaking,
- Despite the epicenter of this earthquake likely being in the Inland Empire, downtown Los Angeles will experience 55 seconds of shaking (8 times longer than the Northridge earthquake) and some areas in southern California will experience up to 5 minutes of continuous shaking,
- Over 1800 lives will be lost and there will be over 50,000 serious injuries,
- Electricity and gas will be unavailable for weeks to months, and water will be unavailable in some areas for as long as six months,

2/3 of all hospital beds in Orange County, Los Angeles County, Riverside County and San Bernardino County will be non-operational,

- There will be over 1600 significant fires with hundreds of city blocks completely destroyed, and
- Economic damage to the area will total \$200-\$300 billion dollars.

These are not meant to be a doomsday, extremist views; these are likely scenarios developed by over 300 scientists and disaster experts. What is equally amazing is the number of residents the Emergency

Preparedness Committee has spoken with who are unaware or unprepared. Some have even stated, "Well, I pay my taxes. I'll just call 9-1-1." Unfortunately, there are several problems with relying on this method of getting assistance: 1) the phones are unlikely to work (including cell phones), 2) if they do work, they will be jammed with others trying to call, and 3) if the phones do work and you happen to get through to emergency services, you will not see any assistance for several days because they will be inundated with calls. We can look to Hurricane Katrina in 2005, or more recently, Superstorm Sandy to see how long it takes to get assistance. Emergency Preparedness Coordinators and first responders in Orange County have already stated that we should all be self sufficient for the 72 hours after a disaster. Your Nellie Gail Emergency Preparedness Committee cannot emphasize enough: In the event of a major disaster, do not expect outside help for at least 72 hours and likely longer.

Dr. Lucy Jones, the world-renowned seismologist from Caltech and the US Geologic Survey, stated that the key to preparing for an earthquake is to network with your local resources before the earthquake occurs. This is precisely what has developed with the Nellie Gail Emergency Preparedness Committee. Are you a part of it? Do you have a 30-days of supplies in your earthquake kit? Have you contacted your Block Captain?

Over the past several years, your Nellie Gail Emergency Preparedness Committee has been providing you with information through the Pony Express and the Nellie Gail website (www. nelliegailranch.org) on how to prepare, be selfreliant and be of assistance to your neighbors. Currently, community volunteers include over 40 Block Captain, 6 Area Coordinators and 7 Committee members, all of whom are here to help you better prepare for the inevitable regional earthquake. In the coming months, you will see articles that will help you in preparing before the next earthquake, how to respond during an earthquake, and what to do immediately after the earthquake. Additional articles will include the proper selection and storage of food and water, communications during disasters, proper shelter, light rescue techniques, and other information. Your committee's goal is to help you prepare, because "failing to prepare is preparing for failure" –Benjamin Franklin.

Emergency Preparedness Committee Seeking New Members

Help support the Nellie Gail Ranch community by participating as a member of the Emergency Preparedness Committee. 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



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Nellie Gail Garden Group

The garden group had such a nice Halloween and Christmas party. We decorated pumpkins and wreaths with succulents. We used a container filled with soil and sand. We glued it to the pumpkin tops and then filled them with succulents from our yards. All we had to do was water them once or twice a week and they grew!! We supplied moss to tuck around the containers or ribbons to make them so festive. I still have one on my kitchen table.



For our Christmas/ Holiday party we all bought a gift and exchanged it with each other. That was more fun than I thought!! Afterwards we all had a really nice 37 | The Po baked ham lunch with wonderful side dishes and treats! The garden group had a wonderful year for our first year back from covid.

There is always so much to talk about. I will try and recap some of our questions.

A recap for worm composting: never use meat or dairy products because red wigglers don't eat them. (And you will have insects you don't want besides the smell). They only digest the bacteria/virus and fungus from leaves, brown cardboard, grass, fruit scrapes and vegetable leftovers. Also coffee grinds and eggshells. In your bins, add old soil or new soil, steer or chicken manure so the worms can use this as their bedding. When they finish all the organic products they will give you back wonderful soil to use in your garden. Worms are totally ok to add to your yard. They will drill tunnels to add oxygen to our clay, where the roots will follow with mycelium that will accumulate and produce a healthy environment for our roots to uptake the nutrients in. Red wigglers do so much for our soil.

They will create healthy soil by eating the bad pests and bacteria and viruses. *https://burnabyredwigglers. wordpress.com/2021/04/01/the-close-friends-andpredators-of-red-wigglers-or-compost-worms/*

The next thing I want to talk about is our climate change and what we can do to help our fruit trees. Smoke is very bad for our leaves; it prohibits photosynthesis due to coating our leaves with ash. What you can do is wash them (neighbors' fireplaces are often a culprit) with water but this ash is still very much a pollutant which will go into your soil. I wish this were illegal. Along with adding smoke to our lungs. Folks, consider a space heater or use gas or electricity to heat your homes. Please.

to have so much rain. But who knows what climate change will create for us here in Southern California.

The colder springs have convinced me to hand pollinate my avocado trees since our bees do not pollinate until it's over 58 degrees and for three years now we have had very cold spring temperatures. This is done by using a painters brush and collecting pollen and distributing it to other flowers. I do this over and over again. I did get around 15 Fuertes on my tree once I hand pollinated. I should have had closer to a hundred. My total this year is around thirty avocados from many trees. So if you drop too many flowers, hand pollinate right away. I will be on guard this following Spring.

The squirrels were crazy this year and what this tells me and worries me greatly is our hawks. Please don't use rat poison, use traps instead. Rat poison will get eaten by the hawks and kill them and we so need hawks to kill our squirrels. This unbalance in nature will produce way too many rodents and they will eat all our fruit. I have traps I set up and with the dead rat I feed those healthy creatures to our hawks.

It's very hard to not have rats when we have a lot of animals here in Nellie Gail, chickens, horses, and even goats. These traps are easy to place food inside (peanut butter) and they walk in and it releases down on them to kill them. You just step on it to pull the trap off of them and they slide out to the ground. I can shovel them over the fence and sure enough the birds are flying above happy to have something to eat.

Our weather and temperature changes are very difficult because our subtropicals are having a tough time with all the fluctuations of degrees. Figs, cherimoyas, sapotes, guavas, bananas, and avocados will struggle. Even our citrus trees are not too happy this past year. If it's very cold under 40 degrees just make sure your tree has been watered lightly and even wet the leaves lightly. This will provide some protection from frost. What can also help is make sure you have mulch or any ground covering around the base of your tree to protect its delicate roots.

Climate change is with us and we must diversify our orchards. I have prickly pear and sabra cactus growing that fruit. Hubby loves to peel these with gloves and knives and juice them. I can always give a piece of them if anyone wants some to grow. Our garden group is all about sharing our cuttings and growing flowers as well. We will have a sale on items at the Easter Egg hunt this coming year as we did before covid. That will help support some of our future activities.

RANCH RECIPE



WINTER CHICKEN NOODLE SOUP

INGREDIENTS:

- SAUTE VEGETABLES: IN BUTTER AND OLIVE OIL, COOK 2 CUPS ONION, 1 CUP CARROTS, AND 1 CUP CELERY UNTIL SOFTENED WITH 1 ³/₄ TEASPOONS KOSHER SALT.
- 2. Make ROUX: STIR IN 3 TABLESPOONS FLOUR, THEN GRADUALLY ADD 4 CUPS CHICKEN STOCK AND 2 CUPS WHOLE MILK.
- COOK NOODLES: ADD 4 OUNCES WHOLE-WHEAT EGG NOODLES AND SIMMER UNTIL TENDER.
 4. ADD CHICKEN: MIX IN 3 CUPS CHOPPED ROTISSERIE CHICKEN BREAST.
- 5. FINISH WITH PEAS: STIR IN 1 CUP FROZEN GREEN

PEAS AND COOK UNTIL HEATED THROUGH.

PREPARATION:

- **1.** SAUTE VEGETABLES: MELT BUTTER AND OLIVE OIL, COOK ONION, CARROTS, CELERY, AND SALT UNTIL SLIGHTLY SOFTENED.
- **2.** MAKE SAUCE: ADD FLOUR, THEN STIR IN STOCK AND MILK, BRINGING THE MIXTURE TO A BOIL.
- **3.** Cook noodles: Add uncooked noodles, cover, and simmer until al dente, around 8 minutes.
- **4.** FINISH DISH: STIR IN CHICKEN AND PEAS, COOK UNTIL PASTA REACHES DESIRED DONENESS, AND SERVE IMMEDIATELY.
