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



Nellie Gail Garden Group

The Nellie Gail Garden Group resumed its meetings and events to restart the group after the pandemic. Even though it was nasty weather we couldn't help ourselves and wanted to get an early start on our group. We met at the home of Tina Corso to discuss a simple method of using worms to recycle our waste vegetables and fruit scraps, along with toilet and paper towel rolls, we learned we could use clean cardboard, coffee grinds, tea bags, eggs shells and much to our surprise even wine corks!

We had a demonstration on how to use an almost filled compost bin and make it into a herb garden while we can use a secondary bin to house more worms and make fertilizer for our fruit trees and vegetable gardens using our scraps that we collect. The nutrients from the worm castings supplies the much needed growth for the plants, while the lid keeps out

insects and small rodents. The holes in the containers supply the oxygen for the worms and they will eat all the items we supply to the bin. The more worms you have the faster they will compost and you can then use the castings for fertilizer. This is a very simple way to reuse your scraps. The Red Wriggler worms do not eat live plants, only decaying items as mentioned. So it's very easy to grow onions, garlic, basil, and lettuce in these bins. You can keep them right outside your kitchen door and use when needed. A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A HORSE SHOW



A day in the life of a horse show begins by waking up around 4:30 am and arriving early at the show grounds. The first thing you must do is to ensure that your horse or horses have been fed and given water. As a rider, you need to find out the course you will be required to memorize, so you should locate your arena and learn the course and jump off. You also need to determine how many people are in your class, the schedule for your class, and how much time you have until you need to be ready to show. After that, it's time to prepare your horse for practice before your class. Sometimes this involves lunging them to let them play and get out some energy, and then riding them, or you may have to do only one, depending on how your horse is behaving that day. They aren't machines, so you always have to be prepared for the circumstances you are given that day.

Once you have ridden, lunged, or both, it's time to give your horse a bath and get them ready for the show. You also need to clean and organize your equipment and ensure that it's clean and ready for the show. After your horse is clean, and all your equipment is in order, you need to check the schedule and get ready to show. Approximately 30 minutes before you need to enter the arena, you need to get yourself dressed in your show clothes, get your horse ready, and head to the warm-up arena, where you have your last chance to practice before entering the show ring. Then it's show time, and all the blood, sweat, and tears are put to the test. You will step into that arena and give it all you have.

Whether you win or lose, after you finish showing, your number one priority is to take care of your horse and ensure that they are cleaned, given food and water, and left to relax in their stall until the next time.





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EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

PROVIDING AID AND THE GOOD SAMARITAN LAW

Questions of liability and fear of being sued frequently arise when volunteering or providing aid during emergencies or disasters. What liabilities exist in providing aid? Might I get sued if someone gets worse? What happens if I decide not to provide aid? How does my level of training (or lack of training) play into my liability? These are all legitimate questions that will be answered here, but first some background information.

The Good Samaritan Law of California, established in 1980, provides that "no person who in good faith, and not for compensation, renders emergency care at the scene of an emergency shall be liable for any civil damages resulting from any act or omission." The purpose of this law was to protect those who voluntarily provide aid or assistance during an emergency, regardless of level of training, as long as one acted in a reasonable manner. This statute was tested by the legal case of Alexandra Van Horn v. Lisa Torti.

On November 1, 2004, Alexandra Van Horn and Lisa Torti (both close friends) left a bar at 1:30 AM in separate cars. Van Horn was driving her vehicle at 45 MPH when she lost control and crashed into a light pole. Torti, following behind in the second car,

witnessed the accident, stopped, and proceeded to render aid to her friend. According to court testimony Van Horn's injuries were worsened by Torti yanking her "like a rag doll" from the wrecked car, rendering Van Horn a paraplegic. Torti testified that she saw smoke, feared the car was "going to blow up" and quickly removed her friend from the dangerous situation. The smoke was later determined to be either from the airbag or radiator as no fire or explosion ensued. Torti was found liable for the injuries to her friend, and furthermore, Torto was not protected by California's Good Samaritan laws.



The California Supreme Court agreed with the appellate court's ruling against Torti, that immunizing rescuers from liability applied only to individuals providing emergency medical care, citing the placement of the Good Samaritan statute in the section of the Health and Safety Code dealing with emergency medical services. It was determined that Torti's actions of removing Van Horn did not constitute "emergency medical care." At the time, this ruling significantly affected the willingness of volunteers to render aid to any victims during an emergency. How was a layperson to determine if a victim required medical or nonmedical aid? Was removing a person from a dangerous situation a

medical aid or a nonmedical aid? Because of this ruling, many started to second-guess their role as a rescuer, and many volunteer rescuers were without liability protection. The repercussions of this ruling could have had dramatic and long-lasting effects.

Recognizing the significance of such a ruling and how it would detrimentally affect volunteering or assisting in emergencies, the California Legislature passed Assembly Bill 83 which has amended the Good Samaritan statue so that "no person who in good faith, and not for compensation, renders emergency medical or nonmedical care or assistance at the scene of an emergency shall be liable for civil damages resulting from any act or omission other than an act or omission constituting gross negligence or willful or wanton misconduct." Additionally, to emphasize the importance of this new provision, the Legislature added that the legislative intent is "to encourage other individuals to volunteer and to assist others in need during an emergency, while ensuring those who provide care or assistance act responsibly." It should be noted that you are only encouraged to act; there is no requirement to provide aid as California, unlike other states, does not have a "duty to act" statute.

So, am I covered under the Good Samaritan Law? Yes. If you should come upon an accident or emergency, you should feel free to provide aid (medical or non-medical) without fear of liability. You are covered if you:

- · act in a reasonable manner and provide "due care,"
- · voluntarily provide the aid without compensation or reward.
- · do not have a current compensated relationship with the victim (doctor-patient, babysitter-child, etc.),
- · are not in a medical facility.

What happens if my care or aid isn't perfect? The

aid you provide is not expected to be "perfect." The circumstances often cause adrenaline to be elevated, thus elevating stress and anxiety. These situations may cause your CPR technique to be non-ideal, you may forget to give two breaths, bandage incorrectly or any number of other potential issues. These mistakes or omissions, if they are reasonable for the circumstances, are completely forgivable and not considered liable actions. On the other hand, if you are "grossly negligent" in your actions, such as if you have never been trained in CPR and you proceed to use the heet of your foot to do chest compressions, this would fall outside of the realm of "reasonable" and thus you could be held liable.



What if I don't want to do anything? Because California does not have a "duty to act" or "duty to rescue" statute, one cannot be held liable for not assisting. You may want to ask yourself, however, if you were the victim needing assistance, would you want others around you to NOT act?

I have been trained to do "X", but I did not do it. Am I liable if the victim is now worse? Again, volunteer rescuers in a Good Samaritan situation are not compelled or mandated to perform any actions, even if you are highly trained in those actions. You would not be held liable in this situation

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS



I have no formal medical or rescue training. Does this make me more liable? No. Should you decide, in an emergency, to aid or assist a victim, as long as you provide care in a reasonable manner, then your risk of liability is zero. One way to view this is to ask, "How would someone else with the same level of training act in a similar situation?" If your actions are similar, then you need not worry about liability.

I work as a health and safety officer at my company's plant and one day while at work, one of the workers started to choke. Would I be covered by the Good Samaritan Law if I assisted? Your position is such that you are expected to provide aid or assistance in these situations. If this is the case, you would not be covered by the Good Samaritan law (but covered by your employer's liability insurance.) In this circumstance, you would want to follow the protocols established by your employer and assist to your level of training.

In summary, the Good Samaritan law, and its recent revision, is designed to protect volunteers who elect to provide emergency aid to others, regardless of whether it is medical aid or nonmedical aid. One does not need to fear liability or repercussions of legal action from helping in an emergency. As always, you should act in a reasonable manner and within

your scope of training, but you should not hesitate to help even if you are not trained. Do not fear getting involved, because the life saved might be your own.

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

GETTING TO KNOW OUR DARKHORSE MARINES

One of the rewards of being part of Team Darkhorse has been getting to meet the people who volunteer to serve our country, and so we thought our community would enjoy "knowing" them too. Accordingly, we invited one of the young Infantry officers to do a Q&A with us to share in Pony Express. His is an interesting story.

high school from The Horace Mann School in Riverdale, New York, I attended Princeton University. I graduated in 2014 with a Bachelor of Science in Engineering and went to work for Barclays in New York City within its investment bank. I left the finance world after about a year and went to work for Google as a software engineer.

MEET LT. HILL WYROUGH



Q1: Can you share your hometown, education and prior work experience before joining the Marines?

I was born in New York City, New York and grew up in and out of the New York City area. After graduating

Q2: What was your motivation or reason for your decision to serve?

I joined later in life than most do, but serving in the military was always a goal of mine. I have a long family history of service, as recent as my father, grandfather, and cousins. The opportunity and path of service was on my radar from a young age. Out of college, I pursued other opportunities, and I am grateful for those experiences. Ultimately, I joined because I wanted to return something to my country and honor the traditions of volunteer service in the United States. I left NYC and committed to attending Officer Candidate School in late 2019.

Q3: Why did you select US Marines rather than Navy, Air Force, or Army?

I selected the USMC because I wanted to pursue the toughest challenge and be held to the highest standard. Additionally, the pipeline for officer training is more intense and comprehensive than the other services. Regardless of what MOS, assignment, location, I knew that the Marine Corps promised more than the other services.

PART 2 - PROFESSIONAL TRACK

Q1: What was your first MOS (Military Occupation Specialty), and unit to which you were assigned? What training were you required to complete before you began your first assignment? If you are part of a unit, how large is that unit?

My MOS is 0302 Infantry Officer. Every officer in the Marine Corps goes through a six-month course in



Quantico, Virginia called Basic Officer Course at The Basic School (TBS). The mission of TBS is to train you as a provisional rifle platoon commander, no matter if you plan to be a pilot, communications officer, or logistics officer.

We learn the basics of weapons, tactics, and leadership and we are evaluated across military skills, academics, and leadership. At the end of TBS, you are given your MOS and then move on to your MOS-specific school.

For infantry officers like me, Infantry Officer Course (IOC) is a three-month follow-on course in Quantico, Virginia where we continue our development in preparation for being a rifle platoon commander in an infantry battalion in the Fleet Marine Force.

Following IOC, I received orders to 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, 1st Marine Division in Camp Pendleton, California. I checked in to the Darkhorse in January 2021. The unit is about one thousand Marines and Sailors at full strength.

Q2: What are you (or your unit) currently tasked to do? (If you are tasked with a specific assignment, can you explain how that assignment fits into a larger goal/objective of the Battalion?)

I am the Executive Officer (XO) of Weapons Company. As XO, I am responsible for the daily operations, training, equipment, and maintenance for a company of 160 Marines and Sailors. From January to December 2021, I served as a rifle platoon commander in India Company, leading 40 Marine infantry men and women. During that time, I deployed with the battalion to the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit.

The mission of the infantry is "locating, closing with, and destroying the enemy with fire and maneuver and repelling the enemy's assault with fire and close combat." In some way, shape, or form, everything we do is oriented around that mission.

Q3: What type of metrics/assessments, if any, are used to track progress of your own individual or your units 'toward the goal?

The Marine Corps publishes detailed training and readiness standards at every echelon: for the individual, team, squad, platoon, company, and battalion. The standards span a spectrum of physical readiness and proficiency across your MOS.

As we work towards our upcoming deployment, the leaders in the battalion focus on planning and structuring training so that Marines can progress from the basic to the more complex. We strive to evaluate every event – hiking with load, conducting battalion offensive operations – against those standards so we can be sure that we are ready to move and ready to fight.

PART 3 - PERSONAL OBSERVATIONS

Q1: Is your experience thus far as a United States Marine what you envisioned/anticipated? How so? If not, how so?

Absolutely, and then some. Though the challenge is not to be understated, through my experience, I have grown as a person, leader, and Marine. It has been a privilege to serve alongside such a diverse and dedicated group of individuals.

My wife will tell you I underestimated the demands on personal and family life, so it has been essential to have a supportive family.

Q2: What would you want civilians to know about life in the Corps? How is life in service most differentiated from civilian life (from your perspective).

You are a Marine 24/7. Marines are dedicated to the Marines in their charge and that does not stop and start with the traditional workday. The responsibility of being the United States' force in readiness demands a greater degree of dedication to your unit and to your craft.

Q2: In your opinion, based upon your perspective of how civilians perceive the Marines, what do you think might be most surprising, and most unsurprising to a civilian about life in the Corps?

Two things come to mind.

First, I think the reputation of Marines are that we are a ragtag group who joined as a last resort or because we didn't have any other options left. That may be true for some, because the Marine Corps and military service is a great vehicle for service and self-improvement. However, by and large, Marines come from all walks of life and join for a wide variety of positive reasons.

Second, a lot of days are very similar to a normal job: we work in an office, we spend a lot of time working on our computers, and we enjoy weekends in southern California. Other times, our priority is training, and we commit to the mission wholeheartedly. For example, right now, we are executing a service-level training exercise that will last nearly 60 days.

Q3: Do you intend to make a full career in the Marine Corps? If undecided, or if no, what type of work in the civilian world might pique your interest and how would your experience as a Marine enhance or provide skills needed in that role?

In my short professional experience, I have found

that planning more than a couple years out never seems to stick. I don't think I will make a full 20-year career in the Marine Corps, but I'm not sure I'm ready to depart quite yet. One day, I would like to return to the technology sector and continue as a professional software engineer. I don't do much of that in the Marine Corps, but it's like riding a bike. Right now, I'm looking forward to a full 2023 with the Darkhorse.

Lt Wyrough, along with a number of other Darkhorse Marines, will be present on Memorial Day at our city's Half Marathon, 5 and 10K. They will be voluntarily running the race, manning a Static Display at the EXPO finish line, or volunteering along the race course. We have been told that the Marines love the community interaction, and in spite of a demanding training schedule just before, and an upcoming deployment, it is heartwarming to know they choose to spend that day with us. Please come out to run, or bring your families to meet these wonderful young people




