





Director's Message

Hi.

I hope everyone remembers me. My name is Mia, and Loree Blough is my mom. I have been a little unhappy lately, as she has been spending so much time working for the HOA. She said she is working on something called "the Budget". I am not sure I understand but she tried to explain it to me.

Mom said every year the Board analyzes the previous years projected budget & actual costs. Then they try to project what next years costs will be. After hours of independent studying & group discussion, the Board members vote on what next years budget will be. That number is divided by all 1407 homes in NGR and next year's monthly dues are set.

My Mom was worried because she said it looked like the Board was going to have to make a large dues increase. Mom said that homeowners voted to put cameras at the entries & keep the security patrol even though they were going to raise rates. Those 2 items alone caused the dues to go up by \$3.22/month. Then, she said that because when minimum wage went up, it affected everything else and that gas, water, electricity, pest control,

insurance all were projected to increase a lot. Something called "cost of living" went up 5%. Mom said that the Board doesn't like to raise the dues because it makes everybody unhappy. That usually means less treats for me.

Then, she found out that our janitorial cleaning costs were projected to go down. Also, because there were no ongoing legal issues, that our legal costs were going down too. Additionally, some crazy thing called Pickleball has made the tennis center break even. Where do humans get these names? She said that these items helped to offset, whatever that means, the increases. She seemed happy about that! I listened to the zoom meeting and the other Board members seemed happy too. I like it when everybody is happy-I get more treats!

Mom said there were plans to refurbish bathrooms and install kitchen appliances at the clubhouse. Mom explained that the budget year ends on Sept 30th & the new one starts Oct 1. She said the Board will start the project in Sept, which is in this budget year & finish it in the next budget year. This way the costs can be spread out over 2 years and the Board would not have to increase dues for that part of the budget! She said the work should start very soon. My mom wanted to be sure every homeowner understands that the board has kept it's promise, and no portion of this years dues increase AT ALL will be coming from anything related to the clubhouse remodel!

I hope this goes fast because other Board members animals & I are still wanting to have a Yappy Hour at the clubhouse!!

I told Mom that I was getting bored listing to all of this. She said the entire budget report will be sent to all homeowners with lots of details. Sure glad I don't have to read that!

Anyway, during the meeting the Board added everything up & said that the dues would be going up by \$ 4.80/ month which is a 3% increase. They all seemed to think that was really good! Joyce Taylor's dog, Micha, even ran around the house celebrating. Joyce had to leave the meeting to calm her down. I am proud to say I was much better behaved!

Well, that is it for me this month. I hope I get to write another message that is more fun. I didn't like this one that much-I had to learn too many things. It is hard for a little dog like me.

I'll see everyone at the park!









II. ASSOCIATION BUSINESS

A. CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL OF 2021-22 RESERVE STUDIES

Resolution: To approve the 2021-22 Reserve Studies and funding reflecting 96.6% funding compared to 95.5% last year.

B. CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL OF 2021-22 FISCAL YEAR DRAFT BUDGET

Motion: Park Second: Taylor

Resolution: To approve the 2021-22 Association and Cost Center Budgets for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2021.

• The approved budget will incorporate a new assessment level at \$485.40 per quarter, an

increase of \$14.40 per quarter (3.1%) above the current \$471 level. The monthly increase is \$4.80.

- The driving factors for the increase are as follows:
- 1. Consistent with the June 2021 homeowner vote the license plate recognition cameras have been included in the budget at a rate of \$2.84 per homeowner per month.
- 2. Consistent with the June 2021 homeowner vote the mobile patrol security remains in the budget and was increased \$0.38 per month.
- 3. The insurance expense line item increased \$1.36
- 4. The Tennis and Equestrian Center budgets are funded by boarding and club membership income with no assessment allocation.
- 5. The Swim Center allocation from assessments remains at \$9.30 per month with public membership fees offsetting 36% of the overall operating and reserve expense.

Note: The Board approved increasing the trailer storage fees at the Equestrian Center by \$15 per month to balance the Equestrian Center budget.

The motion carried unanimously.

The next Regular Open Session Board of Directors meeting will be held on Tuesday, August 20, 2021 at 7:30 p.m.



Swim Center News

Anicka Delgado's Olympic Journey

19-year old Anicka Delgado made our Nellie Gail Ranch community proud this Summer when she swam in the Tokyo Olympics for Ecuador - where she holds a dual citizenship. Coached by her two-time Olympian father and owner of Evolution Racing Club, Felipe Delgado, Anicka swam in the Women's 50m and 100m Freestyle.

Training

Training for the Tokyo Olympics was a test of mental strength. 7 weeks before the South American Qualifiers, Anicka chose to stop practicing with her team, and begin training solo with her dad, Felipe, practicing every morning at 6 AM at the Nellie Gail Ranch Swim Center. When she was just 1 week



away from the qualifiers, COVID hit, delaying the event for 8 months. To ensure her progress was not lost, she chose the difficult path, continuing to train solo, and she decided to red shirt her first year at USC. She spent her first year of college taking classes online from home, while swimming with her father/coach every morning. Her training began to take a tole on her mentally, but with the support of her dad, family, and friends, she persevered.

Qualifying

When it was finally time to compete at the South American qualifiers, her goal was to earn 3 bronze medals to qualify for her first Olympics, with her real sights set on the 2024 Paris Olympics. Not only did Anicka qualify, she took home 3 golds, placing her in the lead for South America entering the Olympics.

Results

At the Olympics, Anicka swam in the Women's 50m and 100m Freestyle, where she broke two national records for Ecuador! Her time in the 50m Freestyle was the fastest out of all Latin American swimmers at the Tokyo Olympics, and her time in the 100m Freestyle was the second fasted for South America.







Olympic Highlights

Opening Ceremony: Anicka shared that the reality of the Olympics truly hit her once she walked out for the Opening Ceremony. Up until then, it had felt like just another competition, then suddenly there were cameras all around her and she was pulled into the moment of that once in a lifetime experience. As her coach, her dad was at the Olympics with her, recording every moment on his Instagram (@felipe_delgado_10

Dining Hall: Full of food from every culture, Anicka loved the dining hall because she was able to learn about so many different countries and see everyone come together in one place. To accommodate the varieties of cultures and athlete diets, the dining hall offered a taste of just about everything!

What's Next

After a year of training solo, Anicka is headed off to USC for her sophomore year, where she will swim for Coach Jeremy Kipp and study Business Administration. With the new rule changes, she can also seek sponsorships as she prepares for the Paris Olympics in 2024. We know great things are in store for Anicka!

Team Darkhorse

GOING FROM 70 TO 80 | PART 2


These articles are not about keeping up with traffic on the I-5, but are about my rewarding experiences while serving on Team Darkhorse over the past decade. Hopefully, the sharing of these experiences will inspire other volunteers to join the noteworthy efforts of the Laguna Hills Marine Support Committee. The first article focused on interaction with Gold Star families and wounded veterans. This article will address experiences while supporting the active duty Marines, Sailors and families of Laguna Hill's adopted Marine Battalion, known as "3/5" or as the "Darkhorse Battalion."

Some of the early interaction that I had with the Darkhorse Battalion was shortly after they returned to Camp Pendleton from the difficult 2010-11 deployment to Afghanistan. Team Darkhorse was able to present the battalion with a Fallen Hero statue that honors the twenty-five Marines who were killed in action. The Commanding Officer from the deployment, Lieutenant Coronel Jason Morris (now a Brigadier General), graciously thanked us for the statue and told us that it serves at a reminder to the currently active Marines of the sacrifices made by their predecessors. General Morris continues to send Team Darkhorse notes thanking us for



our support of the Darkhorse Battalion. The statue remains on the quarterdeck of the battalion headquarters where it represents Team Darkhorse's commitment to the Darkhorse Battalion.

In recognition of our support, members of Team Darkhorse were invited to participate in "Jane Wayne Day" in 2011—an event that allowed Marine spouses to experience Marine training on the obstacle course, rifle range and in other activities. Even though I was approaching age 70, I decided to participate. As I pulled my way up the first eight-foot structure on the obstacle course, I realized that this event was going to be far more challenging than the obstacle courses that I ran 48 years earlier during Navy flight training. Eventually I fell when jumping from telephone pole to telephone pole. The Marines insisted that I be taken to the



The highlight of the day occurred after I caught up with our group on the rifle range. I was recognized as the most proficient shooter in that event. However, a close review of my target revealed that it had more holes than the number of bullets that I had fired. Apparently, the Marine wife next to me had been missing her target and hitting mine. I thanked her for her assistance.

Late in 2011, Team Darkhorse began collecting toys for the Battalion Christmas party. Nellie Gail residents quickly filled toy collection boxes that year and continued to do so in subsequent years. I wish that these generous donors could witness the joy that I see when the toys are given to the children of the Darkhorse battalion.

A nice surprise occurred at the 2012 Darkhorse Battalion Christmas party--a monkey pod bar that I had given to the Battalion was







prominently on display. The bar was purchased in the Philippines in 1966 and had served as favorite "watering hole" through the years for my Navy friends from Hawaii, Florida, Italy and California. It needed a good home in a military environment, so gifting it to the battalion seemed appropriate. The 3/5 Commanding Officer made certain that it was highlighted at the Christmas party that year. The bar continues to be used today and I get to tell Navy stories to Marines when I visit the club in Camp Pendleton where it resides.

There is an historic chapel in Camp Pendleton named after Father Vincent Capadanno, a Navy Chaplin who was killed in Vietnam while comforting wounded Marines on the battlefield. He received the Medal of Honor posthumously. In 2012-13, Mike Bland, the founder of Team Darkhorse, constructed a 24 by 16 foot Memorial Deck in front of the Vincent Capadanno Chapel. After the deck was completed, the Battalion Chaplin told us that the deck had been used for a wedding. Because the bride had difficulty getting over the rough terrain surrounding the deck, the Chaplin asked if we could improve access to the deck.

Grants from the Kroger Company and Masco provided for the purchase of materials to improve the area surrounding the deck. I was one of the Team Darkhorse volunteers who provided the labor. Fortunately, we received some assistance from some young physically fit Marines. As we worked installing a retaining wall, laying pavers and improving landscaping, Marines often stopped by to thank us for our efforts. I thought about the contrast between the support of the military that we were providing that day and the prevailing negative response to the military during my Vietnam era. It felt good to be part of the more appropriate civilian response that exists today.



The Memorial Deck which honors the 25 Marines from the Darkhorse Battalion who were killed in Afghanistan has been visited by Gold Star families and is used frequently for cook-outs and other activities. I feel proud to have participated in this project.

One of the ways that Team Darkhorse supports the Battalion is to have welcoming parties on site every time the Battalion returns from deployment. A memorable moment at one of these homecomings was related to a "first kiss" event that the Marine wives had organized as a raffle to raise funds for the Marine Corps Ball. The winner of the raffle was entitled to be first in line at the door of the bus carrying the Marines returning from a seven-month deployment. Her Marine would be the first one coming off the bus and she would get the first kiss.

Anticipation grew as the bus made its slow journey across the parade deck towards the wife who was holding her four month old daughter—a daughter who was born during the deployment. The bus finally stopped, the door opened and an excited Marine jumped out to kiss his wife and hold his daughter for the first time. Once again, I witnessed an event that was heart-warming.

25 | The Pony Express 26 | The Pony Express Another memorable moment occurred when I dressed as Santa Claus for a small party intended to bring some joy to children who were missing their fathers. As the party progressed, a young boy tossed a nerf football in my direction. I picked it up and passed it to him. He shouted, "Mom, I'm playing football with Santa Claus." It felt good to bring a little joy into the life of a boy who missed his father.

Team Darkhorse members often are rewarded when Marines thank us and express their gratitude for our sponsorship of baby showers, welcome home events, pizza parties, gifts sent to deployed Marines and emergency assistance. Our support certainly appears to be vital.

I have developed a lot of respect for the United States Marine Corps. The Commanding Officers are capable, well-educated and well-spoken. The Master Sergeants have consummate leadership skills. The officers and non-commissioned Marines are dedicated professionals. The social function that the Marine Corps performs for our society is not always well understood. Young individuals often come out of high school with a lack of direction. The Marine Corps provides discipline and gives these young people direction which proves helpful when they return to civilian life.

As stated in the last article, I am approaching age 80 and reflecting on the past decade of wonderful experiences while working with Team Darkhorse. My hope is that a group of younger volunteers will step forward when I become too old to participate in Team Darkhorse activities. 

Emergency Preparedness

Surviving the Earthquake, Steps to Take BEFORE It Happens

This is one article in a series written by your Emergency Preparedness Committee to help you prepare, be self-reliant and be of assistance to your neighbors in the event of a regional emergency. Every month we see and hear in the news of natural disasters (earthquakes, tornadoes, floods, and hurricanes) that should remind us of the importance of preparation. By failing to prepare, you are preparing to fail (Benjamin Franklin).

The information provided is not meant to be exhaustive or complete, but instead is a good starting point in your planning process of preparation. These articles, and additional information, can also be accessed and downloaded through the Nellie Gail website (www.nelliegailranch.org) by signing in, clicking on the Resource Center tab, and opening the Emergency Preparedness Folder.

Last month we described the likelihood ("inevitable" according the USGS) and possible magnitude (7-10 times stronger than Haiti) of an earthquake striking the Southern California area. Despite that devastation, earthquakes are very survivable with simple preparation. You can minimize the damage within your home and improve your chances of rescue and full recovery by taking some very simple steps. This month's focus will be an overview of what should be done BEFORE the earthquake occurs. The Boy Scouts say it best in their motto, "Be Prepared." In order to minimize injury and inconvenience, we must prepare ourselves, our home and our community. Below are some basic, yet essential steps to becoming prepared.

Most of us have our water heater strapped to the wall, but are the straps sturdy and attached to studs? Water heaters weigh anywhere from 600 lbs to over 900 lbs. Check your water heater straps to make sure they can support this weight (the old "plumber's tape" and nails are woefully inadequate.) This is important for several reasons: it lessens the chance of a gas leak and fire, it minimizes your chances of flooding from broken water pipes, and it preserves 75-100 gallons of usable drinking water should you need it. Water heater straps are available at any hardware store and can be easily installed with minimal effort. If you are not sure how to do this, a handyman can easily accomplish this in about an hour.

Attach a gas and water shut off tool on your gas meter and practice how to use it. Attaching it to the meter with a lightweight chain or thin cable is important so it won't get lost nor will you waste time searching for it through the mess and devastation in your garage while gas is leaking from your water heater (which is probably in your garage as well.) Practice shutting off your water from the meter (at the street) and/or from the entry point in your home (usually found at the base of your front yard hose bib.)

ALL unsecured items on your walls and shelves WILL BE on the floor. Most of our homes have a hallway or two with family pictures hanging on it. The floors in these hallways will be littered with broken glass. Secure your pictures (especially ones over or near your beds) so that they can't fall off. This is easily done by placing two or more finishing nails into the wall immediately above the frame of the hanging picture. These nails will prevent the picture from coming up and unhooking from the picture hanger. Kitchens are also notorious for being extremely vulnerable to earthquakes. Contents from your cabinets and drawers will likely be on your floor, including food, cooking utensils, pots and pans, broken jars, etc. This can be minimized by having childproof locks on the cabinets. Yes, this is inconvenient and most will not do this but at least consider this for lesser used cabinets and glass containing pantries. It is strongly recommended that the cabinets containing household chemicals (cleaning supplies, etc.) be childproofed as the chemicals can be hazardous by themselves, possibly fatal if mixed with other chemicals. The lock will prevent these chemicals from spilling and mixing with each other.

Tall furniture, book shelves and refrigerators should be attached to the studs behind them. Rescue teams have seen refrigerators that have "walked" from their location, travel 6 feet across the kitchen floor and take

out large chunks from a granite counter top (Northridge Earthquake, magnitude 6.7, 1994.) These furniture attachment straps are easy to install and readily available at Home Depot or other hardware stores.

With all the broken glass described above, you should have closed-toed shoes under your bed (some also recommend that you store one of your emergency flashlights in these shoes so that it will always be nearby.) You do not want to be running down a dark hall in bare feet or slippers with broken shards of glass on the floor as one of the most common injuries from earthquakes is from victims cutting their feet on broken glass within their own home. Avoid the temptation of running to different rooms or running outside; FEMA research shows that most earthquake injuries happen when one is entering or exiting a structure.

Prepare by having adequate food, water and supplies. This is a whole topic in itself and will be thoroughly covered in a future article, but to summarize, one should have one gallon of water per person per day, canned or dried foods that require little or no preparation, and shelter (tents, tarps, blankets, etc.) in the event your home is uninhabitable.

An Earthquake Fault In Our Own Backyard?

On Monday, April 23, 2012, a 3.9 earthquake stuck much of south Orange County. This quake's epicenter was located in Laguna Niguel (specifically near the corner of Crown Valley Parkway and La Paz). Most of the readers of the Pony Express won't remember this earthquake, and although no injuries or property damage occurred and having startled only a few residents, it definitely startled the geologic community. This small earthquake brought to light a little known "thrust" fault, the San Joaquin Hills fault. Thrust faults are difficult to identify because unlike the San Andreas Fault where the fracture of the earth's crust is visible and on the surface, thrust faults have fractures deep beneath the surface. One might ask, "Since these faults are under the surface, aren't they less dangerous?" Geologists feel that these blind thrust faults are likely more dangerous since their boundaries can't be identified. Geologists were not aware of the faults that caused the 6.7 magnitude Northridge Earthquake (1994) and the 6.0 magnitude Whittier Narrows Earthquake (1987) until the ground started shaking as both were caused by these blind thrust faults. We now know a blind thrust fault lies literally in our backyard. All the more reason to be prepared.

New Earthquake Kit Option

As many of you know, I have assembled a very extensive earthquake kit that should easily sustain my family in the event of an emergency. I chose to assemble my own (vs. purchasing a pre-made kit) because I could customize it and to insure that I had high quality items in my kit. All to often, pre-assembled kits cut costs by using inferior products (and you certainly don't want inferior products when your life may depend on it.) Additionally, these kits often contain items that sound good, but are of limited usefulness. For these reasons, I have always directed our readers to sites to assemble your kit (using the previously published list of items for an earthquake kit), but I have not recommended pre-made earthquake kits.

Recently, I had a chance to evaluate a high quality, pre-assembled earthquake kit that made its debut at the Los Angeles County Fair. The company is actually a local Orange County company, Emergency Case (www.emergencycase.com). It should be noted that my evaluation below of Emergency Case is done so without their knowledge or input, and that this author and other members of the Nellie Gail Emergency Preparedness Committee have no financial interest in Emergency Case, nor do we receive any financial considerations from them.

Most impressive is that much thought went into developing this particular kit. The items in the kit are of high quality (including some Stanley-branded tools that I want to include in my current kit.) They have designed this emergency kit around five basic components: Food and Water, Shelter and Sleep, Advanced Medical, Tools and Safety, and Health and Hygiene. Each of these five components

are packaged separately within the case and easily identified as such. These kits include a sleeping bag and bivouac sac, shelter/tent, water filter, head lamps and a number of items not found in the cheaper pre-made kits. Of particular interest to me was the Advanced Medical component. The supplies found here are more robust than your basic first aid kit. These "advanced" items include a SAM splint, hemostatic gauze, burn relief ointments, etc.


One of the inherent difficulties with pre-made kits is that one size doesn't fit all. Emergency Case addresses this by allowing you to purchase additional components based on your needs. One can purchase a "food vault" for additional food and water, and/or purchase a 2 person add-on kit (the standard kit accommodates a family of four). There are still items that one will need to add to have a fully ready emergency earthquake kit, but these items (toilet paper, eating utensils, etc.) are minor and not difficult to acquire.

The other impressive part of this case is the case itself. This is not a bucket or soft-sided bag; Emergency Case uses high quality, hard sided, waterproof cases that can be wheeled along much like luggage (in the event you need to move.) On their website is a video showing the ruggedness of their case. Another plus is that these cases are made in "rescue orange" for easy identification and are stackable in your garage.

In summary, this kit is ideal for the non-do-it-yourself individual but still desires a high quality, ready-made earthquake kit. It should be noted, however, that having even a high quality earthquake kit alone does not make you truly prepared. You will need to add knowledge; something that you will continue to receive from your Nellie Gail Emergency Preparedness Committee and these articles in the Pony Express. Future articles will address what to do DURING and AFTER an earthquake, as well as how to turn off utilities, if necessary. 




Meet Your New Neighbors: Farzad & Parvaneh



The Puzzle Paddock

Ranch Recipe





Prep Time: 10 Minutes

Cook Time: 15 Minutes

Servings: 4 - makes about 8 large pancakes

Ingredients

Pancakes

3⁄4 cup milk 1 1⁄2 tablespoons vinegar 1 cup flour

3 tablespoons sugar

1 teaspoon cinnamon (if you really love cinnamon you can add another ½ teaspoon)

1 teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon salt 1 egg

2 tablespoons oil

Apple Topping

2 tablespoons butter 2 apples peeled, cored, and diced 2 tablespoons brown sugar ½ teaspoon cinnamon ½ cup maple syrup

Apple Cinnamon Pancakes

Change up the same old pancake and make these Apple Cinnamon Pancakes! Fluffy cinnamon pancakes with an ooey, gooey apple topping make the most perfect cozy breakfast.

Directions

Step 1: Preheat a skillet to medium-high heat (275 degrees).

Step 2: Whisk together the milk and vinegar and allow to rest for 5 minutes.

Step 3: While milk is curdling, whisk together flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt in a large bowl.

Step 4: Whisk egg and oil into milk. Add wet ingredients to dry ingredients and stir until combined (don't over-mix, it should still have some lumps).

Step 5: Spray skillet with cooking spray. Use a 1/4 cup measuring cup to pour batter onto skillet. Cook about 2 minutes until bubbles form and the edges start to look "dry". Use a spatula to flip the pancake and cook another 1-2 minutes on the other side. Set pancakes aside and repeat with remaining batter.

Step 6: Add butter, apples, brown sugar, and cinnamon to a medium sauce pan. Stir over medium heat 3-5 minutes until apples are very tender. Stir in syrup. Serve apple topping over warm pancakes.
